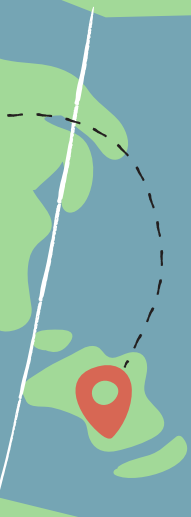

The closest airport to Cambridge is Stansted Airport which is only a 30-minute bus or train journey away.

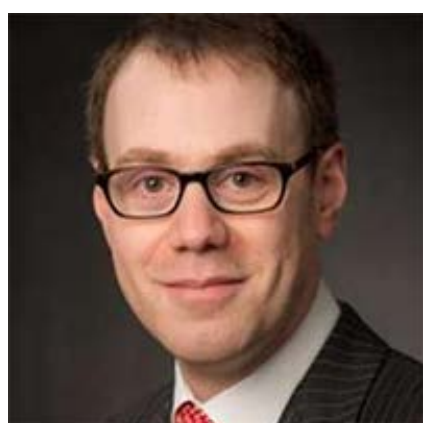
